

And Another Thing...

That's Wrong with the Senate's Amnesty Bill



It gives cover to terrorists.

- Any terrorist can walk into a federal office, present a fictitious name—and most likely walk out the next day with a probationary Z visa, complete with a government-issued ID card backing up his new, false identity.
 - All the “documentation” required is an affidavit saying the visa applicant has been in the country since before Jan. 1, 2007, and a corroborating piece of paper—a pay stub, bank statement or other easily falsified bit of “evidence.”
 - The feds will have to process tens of thousands of applications every day—with only 24 hours to “spot the terrorist.” If the files disclose no damning information about “Rumplestilskin Higgenbotham” (or whatever name the terrorist uses) within 24 hours, the visa and ID card must be issued.
- The bill also affirms the serious problem of “sanctuary” cities—such as New York, Los Angeles and Detroit. In violation of existing federal law, sanctuary cities bar local police from informing the federal government about their contacts with illegal aliens, thus protecting alien criminals and terrorists.
