In Alaska, Marriage Drops the Probability of Child Poverty by 85 Percent

The rapid rise in out-of-wedlock child bearing is a major cause of high levels of child poverty in Alaska.

Some 26.5 percent of single mothers children were poor in 2008 compared to 3.9 percent of married couples with children.

Single-parent families with children are more than six times more likely to be poor than families in which the parents are married.

The higher poverty rate among single-mother families is due both to the lower education levels of the mothers and the lower income due to the absence of the father.
